Slow and Steady Does the Trick

Hello from Grand Teton National Park [just south of Yellowstone National Park] in the great state of Wyoming! We spent our Labor Day weekend here basking below two-mile high Mt. Moran. The mountain is so high it still has a glacier. We got as close as we could to Skillet Glacier when we kayaked around Leigh Lake, a lovely small body of water fed from glacial run-off. While we were in Canada a few weeks ago we got to ride out on top of the largest glacier on this continent. We even stood out on the glacial ice.

What makes a glacier a glacier rather than just extra deep snow pack? Glaciers move. The pressure of all that ice actually melts the lowest layers. So the whole thing, which can be hundreds of feet deep, actually floats along on a thin layer of water. As the glacier moves it carries boulders and all sorts of debris along with it. When the ice melts the boulders are dropped along the way. And the debris collects in big piles. So, this pile of slow but steadily moving ice has the power to carve out mountains and reshape valleys.

What do glaciers have in common with winning races?

Very seldom does the racer who is way out front in the first lap go on to win the race. He usually manages to find a way to get into trouble somewhere along the way. The wise driver bides his time while planning every move so as to stay clear of trouble while keeping a close eye on the leader. That is the one who more often than not ends up on victory lane.
